# Archaeological evaluation on land north of Carpenters Farm, St Marys Road, Great Bentley, Essex, CO7 8NJ

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#### 1 Summary

An archaeological evaluation of nine trial-trenches was carried out on land north of Carpenters Farm, St Marys Road, Great Bentley, Essex in advance of the construction of seven dwellings with associated parking facilities, access and groundworks. Although the site is located on the edge of a village green of purportedly medieval origins, and in the midst of a series of cropmark complexes, the only features present were a natural silt patch and a natural hollow.




Fig 1 Site location and trench layout in relation to proposed development (dashed blue lines).

#### 2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This is the archive report for an archaeological evaluation by trial-trenching on land north of Carpenters Farm, St Marys Road, Great Bentley, Essex, which was carried out 12th-13th November 2018. The work was commissioned by R H Carpenters (UK) Ltd in advance of the construction of seven dwellings with associated parking facilities, access and groundworks and was undertaken by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT).

In response to consultation with Essex County Council Place Services (ECCPS), Historic Environment Advisor Teresa O'Connor advised that in order to establish the archaeological implications of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with the *National Planning Policy Framework* (MHCLG 2018).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for archaeological trial trenching*, detailing the required archaeological work, written by Teresa O'Connor (ECCPS 2018), and a written scheme of investigation (WSI) prepared by CAT in response to the brief and agreed with ECCPS (CAT 2018).

In addition to the brief and WSI, all fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with Historic England's *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE)*, and with *Standards for field archaeology in the East of England* (EAA **14** and **24**). This report mirrors standards and practices contained in the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and guidance for archaeological field evaluation* (ClfA 2014a), *Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials* (ClfA 2014b).


#### 3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background draws on the brief and Essex Historic Environment Record (EHER) held at Essex County Council, County Hall, Chelmsford, Essex (ECC codes below refer to SMR numbers).

The site lies along one side of an historic triangular green considered to be medieval in origin and along which dispersed settlement would have been located. Modern settlement at Aingers Green began in the early to mid 20th century with the piecemeal construction of housing. The green is identified as Angel Heath on the Chapman and André map of 1777, with settlement clustered around the eastern projection (see map 1 below). The route of St Marys Road roughly follows the eastern edge of the green as seen on the 1777 map.

The site lies within a landscape surrounding Aingers Green containing potential features recorded as cropmarks through aerial photography. The closest site of archaeological significance is a field to the south of the site in which cropmarks suggest a possible ring-ditch and linear features (south of Carpenters Farm, ECC17028). Adjacent to this site are three areas of cropmarks including several linear features (north of South Heath ECC2963), linear features (north of Dial Road and south of Colles Brook ECC17027) and a double-ditched trackway, linear features, pits and three possible small ring-ditches (east of the Lodge ECC2982). To the west of Aingers Green

there are a series of linear features, pits, ditched trackways and possible enclosures (ECC3165 and ECC2955). To the north of Aingers Green there is a large area of cropmarks thought to include rectilinear field systems and a rectangular enclosure with some divisions (ECC3105). Essex County Council field archaeology unit carried out an evaluation and excavation within this area on land of St Marys Road (ECC47474). They found evidence of use of the site in use from the early medieval period through to the modern period, including 13th-century boundary ditches and pits and 15th-century gullies alongside a series of features dating to the 17th and 18th centuries. The cropmarks show there is the potential for earlier settlement evidence to survive within the site, especially for identifying earlier phases of field boundaries.

#### 4 Aim

Archaeological evaluation was undertaken at this site to ascertain the extent of any surviving archaeological deposits that may exist on site.






Fig 2 Evaluation results.

#### 5 Results (Figs 2-3)

Nine archaeological trial-trenches were machine excavated under the supervision of a CAT archaeologist. All trenches were 10m long by 1.8m wide, aside from T8 and T9, which were 30m long and 1.8m wide, and were excavated to natural.

The trenches were excavated through ploughsoil (L1, *c* 0. 29-0.42m thick, friable, dry/moist, medium grey/brown silty-clay with 4% stone) onto natural (L2, soft, moist light/medium yellow/orange sandy-silt).

There were no archaeological features in T2, T3, T4, T6, T7, T8 or T9.

Trench 1 (T1): Natural silt patch F1 was excavated.

Despite being located in an area of archaeological significance, only two features, a silt patch and a hollow, which were both of natural origin, were found.




Fig 3 Feature and representative sections.
