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# 1 Summary

Archaeological monitoring was undertaken on land southeast of telecommunications mast 4170, Main Road, Danbury, in advance of the construction of a new outbuilding and associated groundworks. The development site lies on land with high potential for archaeological remains with Danbury camp (an iron age hillfort), medieval occupation remains and a 13th-century church located close by. Although in an area of high archaeological interest, no significant remains were uncovered.





Fig 1 Site location

# 2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This archive report presents the results of archaeological monitoring on land southeast of telecommunications mast 4170, Main Road, Danbury which was undertaken on the 15th April 2019. The work was commissioned by Inaki Beguiristain, in advance of the construction of a new outbuilding and associated groundworks, and was undertaken by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT)

In response to consultation with Essex County Council Place Services (ECCPS), Essex County Historic Environment Advisor Alison Bennett advised that to establish the scope of the archaeological impact of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with paragraphs 128, 129 and 132 of the *National Planning Policy Framework* (DCLG 2012).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for archaeological monitoring and recording*, detailing the requisite archaeological work, written by Alison Bennett (ECCPS 2017), and a written scheme of investigation (WSI) prepared by CAT in response to the brief and agreed with ECCPS (CAT 2017).

In addition to the brief and WSI, all fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with Historic England's *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE)* (Historic England 2015), and with *Standards for field archaeology in the East of England* (EAA **14** and **24**). This report implements standards and practices contained in the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and guidance for archaeological watching briefs* (CifA 2014a) and *Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials* (CifA 2014b).

# 3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background draws on the Essex Historic Environment Record (EHER) held at Essex County Council, County Hall, Chelmsford, Essex.

Immediately to the north of the site lie the preserved earthwork remains of Danbury Camp hillfort, a scheduled monument (SM 1005571; EHER 5607-10). Prehistoric, Iron Age, Roman and Saxon remains and finds have been located within the defences and close by, and the proposed development site lies close to the possible line of the outer boundary of the hillfort. The line of a Roman road also runs east-west past the northern boundary of the fort.

In medieval times, the 13th-century church of St John the Baptist was built within the fort defences (EHER 30315). This provides evidence for continued medieval occupation of the site and indicates that there may be further evidence of medieval settlement and activity nearby. To the northeast (c 500m) are the remains of a medieval tile kiln (scheduled monuments SM 188; EHER 5628), representing an organised industry which is thought to have operated from c 1275 to 1335.

Identified to the immediate south of the development site are a number of undated linear cropmarks (EHER 18193).

### 4 Aims

Archaeological monitoring and recording was undertaken to identify and record any surviving archaeological deposits that may exist on the site.

# **5 Results** (Figs 2-3)

A concrete hard standing was removed across the development site, revealing a layer of crush (L1). Owing to the type of foundation, it was not necessary to strip the entirety of the building footprint, as the centre needed to be left high and in some places it would need to be built up even further. Two areas were subsequently excavated: 16m of trenching measuring 0.6m wide by 0.5m deep, and a small area where the reduction of the concrete slab resulted in over-stripping of the underlying crush (L1) maesured 8m².

Excavations occurred through the layer of crush (L1, *c* 0.35-0.5m thick, friable, dry grey silty-sand with common brick, concrete and demolition waste) into subsoil (L2, firm, dry, mid brown sandy-silt with occasional stones).

No archaeological features were uncovered.




Fig 3 Representative section.
